As a health care professional, I cannot stress enough the importance of obtaining yearly flu vaccines if you are able to so as to help provide herd immunity for those who either cannot receive the vaccine or are immunocompromised. Please continue to wear your masks in public, avoid large gatherings, practice social distancing and hand hygiene, and stay home if you do not feel well.

Greater Pittsburgh Business and Professional Women celebrated Labor Day in the month of September. In the club's newsletter, it was noted that the holiday is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It is a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity and well-being of the country. It was first celebrated in New York City in 1882, and in 1887 became a national holiday.

The article went on to explain that the history of Labor Day lacks one thing: women. While many historians claim that's because women weren't a part of the workforce back then, that isn't exactly true. In 1843, Sara Bagley of the Female Labor Reform Association in Massachusetts organized textile workers to appear before state lawmakers. They spoke about workplace health and safety risks and petitioned for a 10-hour work day. Freed black women who worked as laundresses in Mississippi formed a union in 1866. In 1869, women shoe stitchers from six states formed the first women's labor organization. And numerous other examples of women's labor movements existed "back then." Labor Day is a celebration of all workers' rights, but the article stated that it is indeed a reminder of women's labor and employment rights—a fight that continues today. This year's club theme is has been deemed "Make Equity a Reality, Not a Dream." Members are encouraged to think of ideas, activities and projects in 2020-21 to support president Maurita Bryant's theme for the club.

The Cresson Local were aware of the valuable and extensive contributions the Sisters of Mercy, women of courage and vision, demonstrated in establishing an educational setting in Mount Aloysius College. Their vision coalesces with the BPW/PA Federation mission to achieve equity for all women in the workplace through advocacy, education, and information. The Local was pleased to submit Mount Aloysius College as a candidate for the 2020 BPW/PA Employer of the Year Citation.

The Mount is a private institution that was founded in 1853. Its setting is rural and the campus size is 165 acres. It utilizes a semester-based academic calendar. The school type is private coed with gender distribution 32% male 68% female. The mission of the Mount is to respond to individual and community needs with quality programs of education in the tradition of the Religious Sisters of Mercy. While the academic focus is paramount, the College also considers spiritual, cultural, social and personal growth as essential elements in the development of the student. Today, the Sisters of Mercy focus on a few key critical concerns: the Earth, Racism, Non-Violence, Immigration, and Women. It is their strong values and dedication to service which helps guide the campus life and Catholic tradition at Mount Aloysius College. On campus there is also the Ann Harris Smith Little People's Place child development center. Children between the ages of two and five are welcome. Parents are encouraged to come by and visit. In addition to offering space for children of students, faculty and staff of the Mount, the facility is also available for members of the local community. The child development center is licensed by the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare.

During 2019-2020 academic year the Mount employed 197 females both full time and part time employees. Five full time female employees were hired with nine full time female employees advanced to a more important position. By establishing schools for women like Mount Aloysius, the Sisters of Mercy helped to create environments where women could be leaders and educators, paving the way to a successful future for so many over the years. Through recognizing the past contributions and building on these successes The Mount has successfully kept pace with changing times. Today the college is a vibrant higher education setting with emphasis on values of justice, hospitality, mercy, and service. In the words of Mother Catherine McAuley, RSM, an early businesswoman and professional who founded the Sisters of Mercy, "Be ever ready to praise, to encourage, to stimulate, but slow to censure and still more slow to condemn".




District 10

The Central Montgomery County BPW used Zoom as their meeting communication line on September 17, 2020. President Nancy Werner welcomed a majority of their 42 members and guests.


