Summer Key 2021 Legislation Report

After the discussion at the State Convention about the Civil Rights Plank of the Legislative Platform, I thought this might be a good time to review the plank and perhaps clear up some of the confusion regarding it.

By definition, Civil Rights are an expansive and significant set of rights that are designed to protect individuals from unfair treatment; they are the rights of individuals to receive equal treatment (and to be free from unfair treatment or discrimination) in a number of settings – including education, employment, housing, public accommodations, and more.

With this definition in mind, let's take a look at each of the lines of the Civil Rights plank:

To encourage and promote diversity in our membership and in others in our communities and actively oppose all forms of institutional and individual racism.

This sentence was adopted at the 2020 State Convention, to bring attention to the systemic devaluing of black lives and to acknowledge that oppression takes many forms. For more information, please read my Legislation Report in the Summer 2020 *Key*.

Actively promote full funding of the Violence Against Women Act to combat domestic violence and the electronic and physical stalking of women.

Every 5 years, since 1994, policy makers have reauthorized and expanded the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). VAWA helps fund Domestic Violence programs, services, and shelters across the country. It must be renewed to ensure that survivors can continue to access these lifesaving supports. Before VAWA there were many more shelters for abandoned animals than battered women. In addition, the bipartisan 2020 House-passed version includes several essential and much-needed improvements—including housing and economic protections. According to the ACLU, a growing number of communities are adopting nuisance ordinances that impose fines and criminal penalties on landlords and tenants when the police are called too many times. These ordinances present two very serious problems for women who experience domestic violence or stalking, two crimes that often occur in one's home: They may prevent victims from calling the police when they are endangered by an abuser or stalker, and they may result in housing discrimination against victims of domestic violence. The House bill also contains a provision to close the so-called boyfriend loophole. By closing this loophole, this makes it illegal for a current or former dating partner convicted of abuse or stalking charges to own a gun and prohibits abusers from purchasing or possessing guns while under temporary protective orders. Such a provision is essential to securing survivor safety overall.

Support background checks for gun purchases that prevent domestic abusers from purchasing and keeping firearms.

This sentence was added in 2017 after the 2015 BPW/PA State Convention body adopted Policy Resolution: "Protecting Domestic Violence Victims from Gun Violence" by a vote of 79-39. Research shows that the presence of a gun in domestic violence situations increases the risk of homicide for women by 500% and 54% of women killed with guns are killed by intimate partners or family members. Allowing abusers to keep guns in the home cause countless tragic deaths. Background checks that do not check for protection of abuse orders is a definite violation the woman's civil rights.

Actively promote full funding for protection and services for victims and survivors.

The Crime Victims Fund supports a broad array of programs and services that focus on helping victims in the immediate aftermath of crime and continuing to support them as they rebuild their lives. Millions of dollars are invested annually in victim compensation and assistance in every U.S. state and territory, as well as for training, technical assistance, and other capacity-building programs designed to enhance service providers' ability to support survivors of crime in communities across the Nation.

Ensure equal funding for female and male participation in high school and college athletics.

Athletic programs are considered educational programs and activities. Title IX is a federal civil rights law stating no institution can discriminate against anybody on the basis of their sex or gender. Title IX is used to rectify long-standing inequities in funding for sports equipment, facilities, training, transportation, and uniforms, etc. Title IX may also increase safety for all students on college campuses from sexual harassment and assault.

Support female veteran's safety and equal treatment while in military service and in their return to civilian life.

In 2000, the Equality amendment to the Military Service law granted equal opportunities in the military to women found physically and personally suitable for a job. Women started to enter combat support and light combat roles in a few areas, including the Artillery Corps, infantry units and armored divisions. Unacceptably high incidents of sexual harassment and assault in the military have only increased to where women fear reporting, retaliation, and threats to career advancement. Removing prosecution of perpetrators from the chain of command is now under consideration by the US Defense Department.

Eliminate all form of sexual harassment and discrimination against women. Bring ALL laws into conformity with the Equal Rights Amendment of the Pennsylvania Constitution.

Since its inception, and for over 100 years, the mission of BPW/PA has been to achieve equity for all women in the workplace through advocacy, education and information. To this day, three major issues have shaped BPW's legislative agenda: elimination of sex discrimination in employment, the principle of equal pay, and the need for a comprehensive equal rights amendment.

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BPW/PA STATE PROJECT: GIRLS ON THE RUN

It is my honor to serve the Federation and President Burger as State Project Chair for 2021-2022. BPW/PA has designated **Girls on the Run** as its State Project for the upcoming year.

WHAT IS GIRLS ON THE RUN?

Girls on the Run (GOTR), a national 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, is a physical activity-based positive youth development (PA-PYD) program designed to enhance girls' social, emotional, and physical skills and behaviors to successfully navigate life experiences. The program's intentional curriculum places an emphasis on developing competence, confidence, connection, character, caring and contribution in young girls through lessons that incorporate running and other physical activities. The life skills curriculum is delivered by caring and competent coaches who are trained to teach lessons as intended.

Girls on the Run was founded in 1996 and is celebrating its' 25th anniversary this year! With over 185+ local councils nationwide, 8 local councils serve our communities in Pennsylvania.





HOW ARE WE PARTICIPATING?

Girls on the Run relies on registration fees, donations, sponsorships, and other support to provide a safe, inclusive, and one-of-a-kind experience for each girl. The registration cost varies by council, and financial assistance is available.

In celebration of their 25th anniversary, our state goal is to **sponsor financial assistance for 200 girls** in the program. While sponsorship varies by local council, we have decided each sponsorship for the purposes of recording and recognition will be valued at \$150.

CANONSBURG LOCAL

On June 17, 2021, Canonsburg BPW was excited to celebrate its 90th Birthday Party at Jackson's Restaurant at South Pointe. A memorial service was held for two of our dear members, Vi Bender and Jill Shook. After dinner, our new officers were installed: Marilyn Mastrangelo, President; Beverly Dellapina, Vice President; Pat Milioto, Secretary, and Sherry Herceg, Treasurer. Outgoing President Kathy Smith conducted the candle installation.

On April 29, 1931, an article appeared in the Canonsburg Daily Notes: "LOCAL WOMEN INTERESTED IN ORGANIZATION OF NEW CLUB, BRANCH OF NFBPWC, TO BE FORMED HERE THURSDAY." Women were invited to attend the meeting at 8 o'clock fast time.

The next day, April 30, a meeting was held with teachers, nurses, doctors' attendants, hospital employees, clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers and insurance agents in attendance. It was stressed that BPW would give opportunity for self-expression, for wholesome recreation, and an opportunity for development of initiative and leadership, and for mental, physical and spiritual growth.

The women were in favor of the organization and the Canonsburg branch named temporary officers. On May 19, the constitution and by-laws were adopted and officers were elected. Canonsburg BPW was chartered May 21, 1931 with 26 women who were "INTERESTED IN THE CAUSE."

Canonsburg remains "interested in the cause."
